Tennessee Bicentennial Stamp Show March 2 & 3, 1996

Guidelines for Exhibiting at the Tennessee Bicentennial Stamp Show March 2-3, 1996 Knoxville, Tennessee

The Tennessee Bicentennial Stamp Show will feature competitive and non competitive exhibits. Non competitive exhibits must contain a minimum of 8 pages (half-frame) while competitive exhibits will be in two categories--single (16 pages) and multiple (more than 16 pages) frames. There will be a \$5.00 frame fee for competitive exhibits and awards will be made by a panel of judges. There is no fee for non competitive exhibits. These exhibits will be eligible for a prize voted most popular by the public.

All exhibits should have a title page and follow APS standards. Pages should be placed in a transparent vinyl or mylar page protector.

The exhibit form and the \$5.00 frame fee if applicable must be received by February 20. If you intend to mail your exhibit it must be received by February 28 (send it registered or insured). For exhibits to be returned by mail, include payment for return postage. If you are bringing your exhibit to the show it must be brought to the exhibit room by 8:00 AM on March 2.

² Samuel Cole Williams, 1933, <u>History of the Lost State of Franklin</u> considers Jonesboro the first capital and Greeneville the second capital. The constitution of the State of Franklin was ratified at Greeneville in 1785.

³ William Blount was appointed governor of the Southwest Territory at its inception in 1790; Blount originally governed from Rocky Mount the home of William Cobb. Cobb's residence was located at the confluence of the Watauga and Holtston rivers. Blount moved to Knoxville in 1791 where he bought land from James White and established Knoxville as the capital. Knoxville was officially founded on October 3, 1791 when the first lots were sold.

⁴ The Tennessee State Constitution was adopted at Knoxville on January 11, 1796 and John Sevier was elected the first governor on March 28,1796. The United States Senate admitted Tennessee to the Union on June 1, 1796.

⁵ Kingston was made the capital for one day so that the legislature could negotiate the Treaty of Tellico with the Cherokees.

⁶ Nashville was declared the permanent state capital by the legislature October 7, 1843

⁷ New Echota was the capital of the Cherokee Nation from 1826-1830. Because the State of Georgia nullified the laws of the Cherokee Nation in 1830, it became impossible for the Cherokees to govern from New Echota. Consequently, Red Clay was established as the seat of government in 1832.

(She had on that one cover - pictures of the governor, the president, and "The King".)

The exhibits were impressive, informative, and entertaining. Thanks to Paul Phillips for doing the judging. The dealers seemed to have had a successful show, also, and we look forward to having many of our dealer friends back next year.

The biggest negatives had to do with publicity (my job). Linn's pulled our announcement prematurely - they apologized for their mistake and have given us credit for 6 free weeks next year. The News-Sentinel had an article describing the show on an inside page of Section B on Saturday, March 2nd. I think we can do better next year.

Anyway, congrats and thanks to all who helped - "Good Show!"

The detailed financial analysis for the show is incomplete (many bills have not yet been received), but the preliminary information from Treasurer Lillard Harvey is that we may have done better than anticipated. An attendance analysis has not been done yet either, but the preliminary count of registration slips shows:

Tom Broadhead made sure that announcements for the show appeared in the philatelic press, and he produced the show flyer as well as the program, and all the large location signs in the registration area.

Every society member owes Lillard Harvey, Treasurer, special thanks for managing the society's finances and for organizing, with Nick Holt's help, the live auction. Tom Robusto, Tom Copas, Mary Ann Toal, Dale Kangas, and Tom Broadhead helped with the auction. Bob Toal and Bruce Roberts called the auction with their usual quick and efficient pace. Mary Ann Toal managed the string pull and the other youth activities.

Ray Ritter, Tom Robusto, Dale Kangas, Paul Reyling, and Tom Broadhead set up the exhibit frames. Paul and Emily Grzyb help dismantle them when the show ended. Judging the exhibits was Paul Phillips. Ray Ritter's exhibit, showing how he makes his own cachets, was voted most popular. We had 10 other exhibits that received considerable attention and interest.

MINUTES OF THE MAY 7th REGULAR MEETING

The program, which had been announced as a "Panel Discussion on Stamp Separations" ended up as more or less a group discussion of the various methods which have been used or are being used for separating stamps.

Twenty-one members were present, plus a visitor - Mary Porter, who described herself as a novice collector. <u>Kent Fearey</u> won the door prize. <u>Tom Copas</u> and <u>Dale Kangas</u> volunteered to bring refreshments for the June meeting.

- the Knoxville First Day of Issue ceremonies for the Tennessee Bicentennial stamp will start at Blount Mansion on May 31st at 7:30 AM and later in the day move to the Customs House (see page 5 for more information).
- the Blount Mansion will be selling a two-color cachet featuring an early map of Tennessee and a picture of Gov. Blount (see photocopy on page 5).

In response to a question, Tom said that the design of the new KPS business cards was not yet complete. The meeting adjourned about 9:50 PM.

MINUTES OF THE APRIL 16th BOARD MEETING

Seven of the eleven directors and your editor were present when the board meeting was called to order about 7:30 PM. Most of the discussion concerned the Tennessee Bicentennial stamp and the ceremonies which would occur in Knoxville for the first day of issue. The people who operate the Blount Mansion were designing a special cachet to be sold at the Blount Mansion with the proceeds to benefit restoration efforts there. A special canceller has also been designed for use in Knoxville.

It is now known that the the Tennessee Bicentennial stamp will consist of a 50-stamp pane with regular adhesive and a 20-stamp pane of self-adhesive (peel-and-stick) stamps. There will be first day of issue ceremonies at Knoxville, Nashville, and Memphis, with Gov. Sundquist and the Postmaster General participating.

Treasurer Lillard Haevey gave the following brief report:

Beginning balance, all accounts, March 1: \$ 3,144.92 Ending balance, all accounts, March 31: \$ 4,922.98 He also noted that not all of the bills for the spring show had been received.

The information provided for the Knoxville first day of issue ceremonies on May 31st for the Tennessee Bicentennial was confirmed (see page 5). The canceller to be used in Knoxville will read "Birthplace of Tennessee". The special canceller to be used in Nashville and Memphis will read "Tennessee Bicentennial". The Nashville ceremonies will be at 5:00 PM, May 31st, at the Bicentennial Mall. It was decided to prepare a limited number of KPS cachets for cancelling at Knoxville and at Nashville for members who can not make the ceremonies. KPS cachets will also be for sale at Blount Mansion, with the proceeds split between the Blount Mansion & KPS. Fellow KPS Members,

Next Friday, May 31, will be the official first day ceremonies for the Tennessee Bicentennial Stamps. Yes, I said ceremonies and stamps. There will be three first-day ceremonies on that day, beginning here in Knoxville, followed by Memphis and Nashville. The two stamps are a "water activated" and a "self adhesive" version of the same design. The self adhesive is being prepared in smaller numbers than the water activated sheet stamp. This will be the first self adhesive commemorative issued by the USPS!

The ceremony in Knoxville will begin at 7:15 am on Friday at the Blount Mansion Visitors Center. Governor Don Sundquist and Postmaster General Marvin Runyon will preside. The stamp will be presented at 7:28, and the ceremony will conclude at 7:35. An autograph session will be held at the Visitors Center from 7:52-8:17. At that time, the official party will be driven to the Customs House downtown for more festivities.

Blount Mansion will be selling a very attractive cachet, depicting Governor Blount and Blount Mansion. That Cachet will sell for \$1.00, and Blount Mansion Executive Director Patrick Clark has kindly agreed to sell our set of Tennessee Bicentennial cachets -\$1.00 of each purchase will go to Blount Mansion.

This will be an exciting event - please try to attend.

Stamp of the Month - 1981 Flag issue of the Republic of China

Stamps donated by Mary Ann Toal

The Republic of China was declared on February 12, 1912 following the abdication of the child emperor Pu Yi, the last ruling member of the Manchu Dynasty. Pu Yi later was made regent and then emperor of the Japanese puppet state of Manchukuo, the occupied Chinese province of Manchuria.

The first president of the Republic of China was Dr. Sun Yat-Sen (1866-1925). Sun Yat-Sen also was the founder of the Kuomintang or Nationalist Party. In 1924, Communists were admitted to membership in the Kuomintang, but by 1927, communist dissent had organized peasants in rural provinces under the leadership of Mao Tse Tung against the national government. Following the Japanese invasion of 1937 and subsequent occupation of China, the nationalists and communists fought a common foe. Post-war civil war resulted in the expulsion of the Kuomintang, under the leadership of Chiang Kai Shek, from the mainland to the island of Taiwan.

The flag of the Republic of China shows a white star with 12 points in the upper left quadrant of blue on a red field. This star

is a common feature of the stamps of China from 1931 to 1947.

In 1978, the Republic of China issued a new definitive series featuring the country's flag. This took the place of the "Construction" issue of 1974-1977, and was followed by the "Lighthouse" issue of 1989-1991. The 1981 flag issue supplanted an earlier version issued in 1978-1980. The 1981 issue consists of thirteen stamps, in denominations ranging from \$1 to \$14; Scott catalogs these stamps at values ranging from 15 to 35 cents.

The Higgins & Gage World Postal Stationery Catalog

The KPS recently purchased a copy of the Higgins & Gage World Postal Stationery Catalog for our library. Arranged alphabetically by country in ten small, 3-ring binders, the H&G catalog is available to be checked out by KPS members who wish to investigate some of the postal stationery in their collections. The following discussion is designed to assist in the use of this valuable reference.

The H&G catalog is most useful as a reference catalog and least useful as a pricing guide. Unlike the Scott postage stamp catalog, H&G is not updated on a regular basis; prices for most items are out-of-date (some are too high, some are too low, others are unchanged) with respect to country specialty catalogs. There are 51 categories of postal stationery in the H&G catalog! Many of these are familiar to most collectors (e.g., postal cards, stamped envelopes, aerograms, newspaper wrappers), and each category, except postal cards, bears a one- or two letter prefix (similar to the way different stamp types are categorized in the Scott catalog). Some of the more exotic types of postal stationery include telephone forms, election envelopes, pigeongrams, and radio lottery cards.

Illustrations in the H&G catalog focus on the imprinted stamps, but, where necessary

also show other parts of the item necessary for proper identification. Examples and prices given are always for entire items! The tendency for the collection of cut squares (as is common for U.S. envelopes) is not encouraged. Listings for the U.S. (part 18, binder 10) include the major varieties found in the Scott U.S. specialized catalog, but less. As mentioned in H&G, paper varieties are not indicated, and the same is generally true for other countries. Where other, more specialized references exist, the editors of H&G draw attention to those sources.

The variety of postal stationery items truly is mind boggling! Abu Dhabi issued 13 major varieties of aerograms from 1964-1971. Zululand issued 4 major varieties of postal cards in 1893. Both Germany and Russia have issued enormous numbers of postal stationery items, particularly illustrated postal cards and envelopes. Even most of the German states had issues; the grand duchy of Wurttemberg is represented by 20 different categories, ranging from postal cards to money orders to parcel post coupons!

The Higgins & Gage Catalog may be purchased in its entirety or by individual alphabetical sections from its publisher: Classic Philatelics, PO Box 5637, Huntington Beach, CA 92646. Classic Philatelics also is a retail dealer specializing in postal stationery.

Ehrlich August 6 - The meeting was convened by President Tom Copas at 8:05; 20 members were present, new member Scott Robertson, and visitor Bill Goodwin. Scott collects U.S., postal history (esp. Florida Keys), and the Martha Washington prexie.

The contract has been signed with Quality Inn for Knoxpex 97, March 1-2. Tom Copas has obtained a lockable metal cabinet to hold the library. He also indicated that Jim Bowles of Stamps, Coins, & Collectibles will sell the 1997 Scott Catalog to KPS for \$25 per volume. KPS has 29 sets of the club's Tennessee Bicentennial cachets, franked with the Tennessee stamp and canceled with the Knoxville first day cancel - price \$5/set for members, \$6/set for nonmembers.

Treasurer Lillard Harvey reported account balances for the fiscal year ending June 30. The meeting adjourned early, following an impromptu program by Tom Broadhead concerning newsletter topics and the James Dean first day of issue. **September 3** - The meeting was convened by President Tom Copas at 8:10 in the new meeting location, upstairs at the First Presbyterian Church. Twenty-four members were present. Bruce Roberts announced commitments from 10 dealers (2 are new) for Knoxpex 97, March 1-2.

Tom Copas announced that the November meeting will be rescheduled from Nov. 5 to Nov. 12 to avoid conflicts with the general election. The November board meeting will be held following the regular meeting on the 12th. The program for October will be Postal Stationery, and the November program will be about First Day Covers.

Bob Toal said that the Knoxville GPO contacted him for ideas concerning a special cancel for the Endangered Species stamps on October 3, the 2nd day of issue. KPS may have a table in the lobby to distribute brochures, and sell cachets. After a request for volunteers to staff the table, there was a discussion about the design of the cancel.

Nicole Pendleton is involved in the nationwide effort to distribute stamps to children and asked for donations. Effie Rule needs donations for door prizes. The meeting adjourned, followed by the program by Tom Broadhead on the use of the club's recently acquired Higgins & Gage World Postal Stationery Catalog. He warned that pricing in the catalog is not current, because the catalog is updated by section - many of which are 10-12 years old.

Stamp of the Month - 12c Cleveland

Grover Cleveland, born in New Jersey in 1837, is best known for being both the 22nd and 24th President of the United States. Having served previously as governor of New York, Cleveland became imbroiled in a dirty



campaign against the Republican nominee, James G. Blaine. A group of Republican reformers, know as the "Mugwumps" deserted that party to support Cleveland, who in 1884 became the first Democrat elected president since James Buchanan.

Cleveland's first term was marked by passage of the Presidential Succession Law (1886), formation of the American Federation of Labor (1886), and the Interstate Commerce Act (1887). The Dawes Act of 1887 gave the President the authority to terminate tribal government and communal ownership of land among Indians.

Although he had a plurality of the popular vote in the election of 1888, Cleveland lost the electoral vote 168 to the 233 of Benjamin Harrison. In the election of 1892, Cleveland won with 277 electoral votes to Harrison's 145, and Populist Party candidate James Weaver's 22 electoral votes.

During Cleveland's second term, he attempted unsuccessfully to restore the native Hawaiian monarchy, which had been overthrown by an American-backed provisional government. The Financial Panic of 1893 assaulted the gold standard of US currency and resulted in a drain on gold reserves by foreign investors. Government bonds were sold in 1894-1896 to help maintain the gold supply. The Anti-Saloon League, favoring prohibition, was founded in 1893. In 1894, the Wilson-Gorman Tariff Act included a 2% income tax on incomes above \$4,000; it was declared unconstitutional in 1895.

Grover Cleveland first appeared on the stamp shown here (Scott 693), part of the Bureau Series of 1923. He also appears on the 22 c "prexy" of 1938 and on the 1986 Ameripex souvenir sheet. Plans for Knoxpex '97 are being made and all the membership should make their plans to attend and to help with the festivities.

Guidelines for Exhibiting at Knoxpex '97 March 1-2, 1997 Knoxville, Tennessee

Knoxpex '97 will feature competitive and noncompetitive exhibits. Exhibit frames are standard APS format that hold 16 pages. Noncompetitive exhibits must contain a minimum of 8 pages while competitive exhibits will be in two categories--single and multiple frames. There will be a \$5.00 frame fee for competitive exhibits, and awards will be made by a panel of judges. There is no fee for noncompetitive exhibits. These exhibits will be eligible for a prize voted most popular by the public.

All exhibits should have a title page and follow APS standards. Each page should be placed in a transparent vinyl or mylar page protector.

The exhibit form and the \$5.00 frame fee, if applicable, must be received by February 24. If you intend to mail your exhibit it must be received by February 28 (sent registered or insured). For exhibits to be returned by mail, include payment for return postage. If you are bringing your exhibit to the show it must be brought to the exhibit room by 8:00 AM on March 1.
